ESTATE DRAINS & SEWAGE

It has now been over twelve months since a deputation of Elmer residents met Nick Gibb MP and representatives of Southern Water Co to discuss problems associated with the overloaded infrastructure and the pumping station situated on The Hard.

A summary of Southern Water Co's action plan was detailed in the February 2005 Estate Newsletter where it was confirmed that during periods of inclement weather there was a calculated infiltration equivalent to standing water covering an area of 15 hectares (37 acres).

Further investigations were promised with the aim of identifying the source of this inundation.

In the mean time we have enjoyed an extended period of exceptionally dry weather! The downside to this phenomenon is that there has been no infiltration capable of being traced and there is the danger that 'the kettle will go off the boil' and all will be forgotten.

Your committee will of course give Southern Water Co a gentle prod to ensure that they carry out their obligations at the earliest opportunity.
